



IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR ALL PARENTS / GUARDIANS

Recently a knife was found on a school bus. After some investigation the school was able to trace its owner. Although it was a vicious looking implement it was eventually established that it had been purchased by the parent who had made it clear that it should not have been brought into school. Possession of such a knife would almost certainly have resulted in prosecution had it been found by a police officer. Knives or any sharp / pointed objects capable of causing injury **ARE NOT** to be brought into school: any breach of this rule will result in serious disciplinary action as has occurred in the past.

As a precaution the school decided to search the bags of all pupils last week and although no knives were found, several pupils were found carrying scissors and one a craft knife. In future teachers will provide this equipment in lessons, if it is required. **Pupils are not to bring scissors or craft knives into school.** Random bag searches will be carried out as required by teachers: a whole school search will hopefully be a rare event but if necessary it will be carried out if the evidence justifies it.

SCHOOL POPULATION AND ACCOMMODATION

This year has seen another increase in the pupil population; my concerns about the capacity of the school's buildings and the adequacy of resources to cope with 1370 pupils have been partially met. The council is examining plans to improve accommodation for sixth form students and children with special education needs in 2006-7. I hope to report in the spring newsletter about the outcome of these discussions. As usual with projects of this nature the initial analysis of costs has proved to be an underestimate!

Once again I have asked the governing body to review the school's standard admission number which is currently 220 for each of Years 7-11. Nearly all year groups are at or close to the standard admission number which is putting great pressure on space and class sizes. Again, I will report later on this issue once we have had an indicative budget for 2006-7 and the governors have held their autumn term meeting.

ADVANCE NOTICE OF POST-16 MEETINGS

The school will, as usual, provide information about the sixth form for students in Year 11 and their parents in meetings at the beginning of next term. The school is piloting the Welsh Baccalaureate in the sixth form.

On Tuesday 10th January Mr. Davey and Mr. Gilbey will give an explanatory talk to students in Year 11 during assembly and period 1. A similar presentation will be made to parents of Year 11 pupils in the Main Hall at 7.30 p.m. There will be plenty of opportunity for questions and discussions.

YEAR 10 COURSEWORK

This week all Year 10 pupils will have received a letter regarding coursework which includes advice on undertaking coursework and gives all the subject deadlines. Please ensure that you, as parents, keep this letter in a safe place for future reference.

BAD WEATHER AND SCHOOL CLOSURE

This year we have had several dire warnings that this winter is going to be particularly severe. Although I have included this warning in previous newsletters it is still the case that several pupils still do not have a valid contact number on school records.

The decision to close the school is never easy and it is not a decision taken lightly but the following factors are taken into account:

- ❑ a significant number of staff (both teaching and non-teaching) live outside the town and it is impossible to run a normal timetable with a high percentage of staff absent or late
- ❑ a significant number of pupils come to school by bus. Once bad weather sets in some of the bus companies will want to set off early. As they are responsible for the health and safety of pupils on the journey it would be reckless to overrule them. It is not difficult to envisage a situation where some children would be stranded if the buses were not available. Disruption is also caused to teaching if a significant number of pupils do not arrive in the morning because of poor weather conditions affecting bus routes.
- ❑ any decision is taken with Ysgol Penweddig as both schools share the same transport.

Although closures are rare parents need to be aware of the following:

- ❑ Penglais and Penweddig will put a message on Radio Ceredigion (103.3-97.4-96.6 FM) by 8.00 a.m. if the school is to close.
- ❑ The Penglais answering machine will contain an information message if the school is going to close or is definitely known to be closing the next day.
- ❑ All pupils **MUST** have left a valid contact number on school records so that we can keep parents informed. **DESPITE REPEATED PLEAS** some pupils still do not have this number. It is needed, in any case, for a medical emergency. Please could all parents check with us that we have an up to date contact number.
- ❑ Please make sure that your son / daughter knows what to do in the event of an early closure. Some pupils, especially younger ones, have no idea what they should do in the event of an emergency closure.

PSHE

Penglais School found itself at the centre of an international crisis last Friday 18th November as part of a Ministry of Defence education programme. Penglais was the latest school in Wales to take part in the new Ministry of Defence Schools Initiative, a programme jointly devised by the MoD and the Department of Education. During the visit, pupils had to deal with a 'global crisis', based on a real life scenario. They took on roles such as the Prime Minister, Secretary of State for Defence or Chief Press Officer and then held a mini Cabinet meeting culminating in a live press conference.

Aimed at Year 11 pupils, the initiative provided a unique opportunity to teach students about Government, citizenship, democracy and world affairs as part of Personal, Social and Health Education.

The day's programme involved a series of presentations, discussion groups and role play, run by a team consisting of representatives of each of the Armed Forces and the Civil Service. The aim was to raise awareness amongst pupils about the importance of their responsibilities as citizens, focusing on such things as the role and function of a Government department (in this case the MoD), humanitarian aid, ethnic diversity, human rights, veterans, conflict resolution and crisis situations.



Sue Scarlett, the Defence Schools Presentation Team Manager for Wales and South West England added: “This initiative has nothing to do with Armed Forces recruitment; it’s about educating children in the ways of the world. We’re giving them an insight into the realities of running a Government and handling crisis situations, and helping them to grasp what it actually means to be a British citizen and the unique role that Britain plays on the world stage.

There is a great mix of politics, geography, history and social science throughout the day which all fits in well with the National Curriculum. Of course it’s good fun too – both pupils and teachers would agree that this provides a refreshing break from the more traditional academic subjects.”

The Presentation Team were delighted by the response of the Year 11 pupils. One representative from the RAF said, “We have delivered this programme to schools across the United Kingdom at comprehensive, public and selective grammar schools. The pupils in Year 11 at Penglais were the most mature, well motivated group we have encountered and are a credit to themselves and the school.
