



THE SIXTH FORM CENTRE PROJECT

During the recent holiday the school received news that the sixth form centre project would be going ahead this year. Although it was agreed that this was an essential project, securing the £700,000 necessary proved difficult. Final confirmation that the money would be available was only received last week. Unusually, the school will be making a capital contribution of £75,000 from its own budget towards the project. Without that contribution the project could not proceed and the governors decided that it was essential not to delay any further.

The building is one of the largest constructed at the school in recent years. It is a two storey building with a 200 square metre communal lounge, a food preparation area, a 180 square metre study area with enough points for 90 computers, three offices, two classrooms, entrance hall, male and female toilets, a disabled toilet, cleaners' store, plant and communications rooms and a lift. The accommodation is designed for 300 sixth formers. The architect's drawings are set out below.

Building work, at the site at the rear of the school adjacent to Cefn Llan, commences next month. The project will be completed at October half term. The existing sixth form centre will be used as a base until the autumn half term. It is hoped that the school will be able to construct an additional car park next to Cefn Llan by September. The construction of the new sixth form centre will enable us to tidy up this area of school with new fencing, tarmac paths and car parks. During construction a significant area of the school grounds next to Cefn Llan will have to be cordoned off. A temporary car park will be opened on the hard court areas during this time.

TRAFFIC CONGESTION

The County Council has recently placed an advertisement for a crossing patrol officer for the rear exit of the school. Although it is much later than I had hoped it is nevertheless a welcome development.

At the time of writing the school is in negotiation with the local education authority about the congestion at the site in the afternoon. We have come up with proposals to improve access in the late afternoon and make the parking of buses easier. I hope to report on this in the next newsletter.

AUTISM CYMRU

Increasing numbers of children are being diagnosed with autism, a condition which causes considerable communication problems. The experience of school for autistic children can be distressing and lonely unless staff and pupils understand about their condition and learn how to react in a positive way.

We already have a number of pupils in Penglais with autism and more will be joining us in September. We are building links with the unit for autistic children in Llwyn yr Eos school.

Autism Cymru was established in 2001 to provide help and support for people with autism, their families and the people that work with them. S4C is making a special appeal on their behalf in June.

We would like to do something to support this appeal. Would you help us?

We are going to challenge the pupils of Penglais and Llwyn yr Eos to build a chain long enough to stretch from one school to the other. We will sell paper links for 10p each. We think we will need about 10,000 links. Everyone who buys a link in the chain will have their name written on it.

We hope the chain will show that we want to link up with pupils who find it hard to communicate and also that we want the two schools to help each other.

We will sell the links from Monday June 5th onwards. We want to finish the chain by Wednesday 14th June. On Thursday June 15th Coastal Challenge cyclists will ride from Swansea in the South and from Amlwch in the North to Aberystwyth. We would like to present the money we have raised to them when they arrive.

YEAR 10 PUPIL SUCCESS

Gabriel Jones, Year 10, auditioned for the Youth Music Theatre UK (YMT:UK) in February and was selected to join the cast of 'Missing Melanie', one of six musical theatre company productions taking place throughout the UK this year. He will be in London from 5th – 18th August working on 'Missing Melanie', culminating in performances. YMT:UK audition young people between the ages of 12 and 21 and invite writers, composers and choreographers to evolve music theatre specifically for young people. During rehearsals the cast are encouraged to input ideas and to develop the production. 'Missing Melanie' was first performed at the Edinburgh Festival in 2005.

Daniel Owen, Year 10, was part of the Aberystwyth and District Squadron Air Training Corps who beat off the opposition to become the Wales Regional First Aid Champions after their competition in Sennybridge recently. Dan, Cadet Sergeant, together with three others represented No. 3 Welsh Wing ATC in the annual championships after winning the Wing Championships. During the competition they had to deal with various scenarios which included skateboarding accident casualties with dislocated knees, a broken jaw, broken ribs, sprained ankle and wounds with embedded glass. They also had to complete written tests and diagnosis. The team have now been invited to compete at the ACF National Championships at the RMC Sandhurst in October.

THE NEW LEARNING SUPPORT CENTRE

An important part of the project was the adaptation of the existing sixth form centre as a new Learning Support Centre. It is planned that the work commences as soon as the new sixth form centre opens. This will be an extensive renovation, including facilities for life skills, classrooms, information technology and recreation areas. At the time of writing it is not possible to give an accurate completion date for this work but it will probably be January – April 2007.

CUSTOMER CARE COURSE

Thirteen Year 10 pupils following the Customer Care course recently took part in a two day study visit to Ireland, arranged by Careers Wales West, Stena Line and South East Ireland Tourism.

Accompanied by course teachers Mrs. Fitches and Mrs. Walker, the students travelled with Stena Line from Fishguard to Rosslare. During the crossing they were given a tour of the vessel and heard presentations by Stena crew members on customer procedures on board. The next day, following a walking tour of Waterford, pupils were welcomed to Waterford Crystal, observing glass blowing and engraving in the factory and looking at retailing skills in the shop.

On the return sailing they took part in a quiz organised by Stena line, finally arriving back in Aberystwyth at a very late hour.

Geography Fieldwork

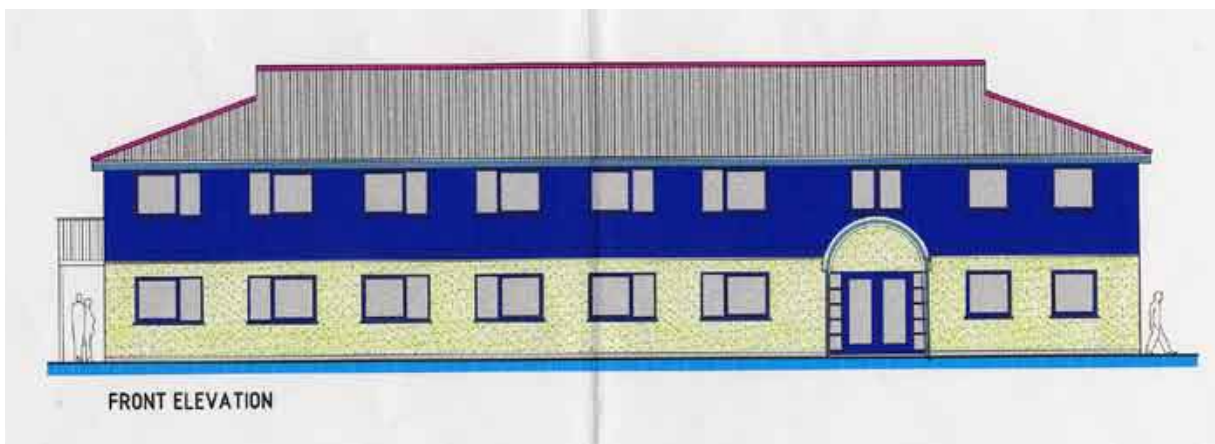

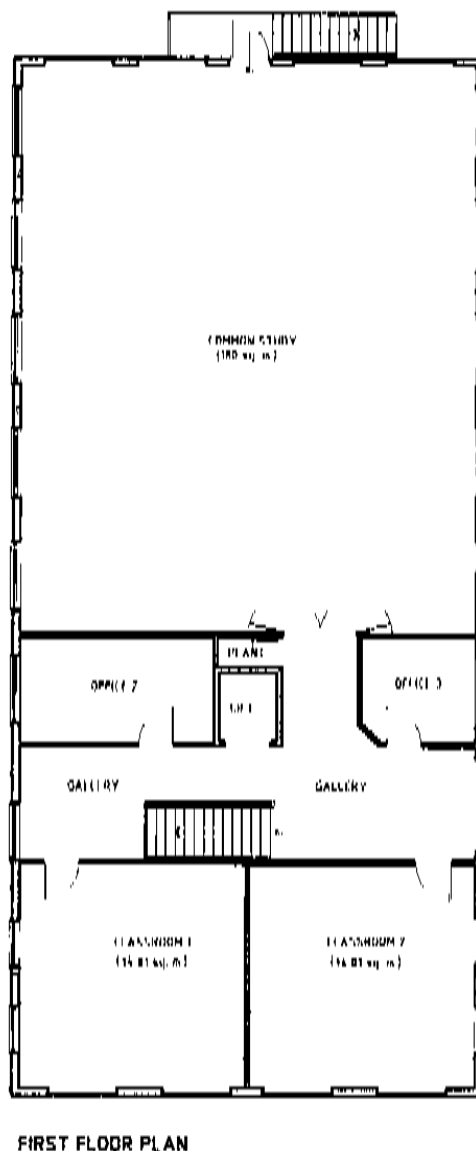
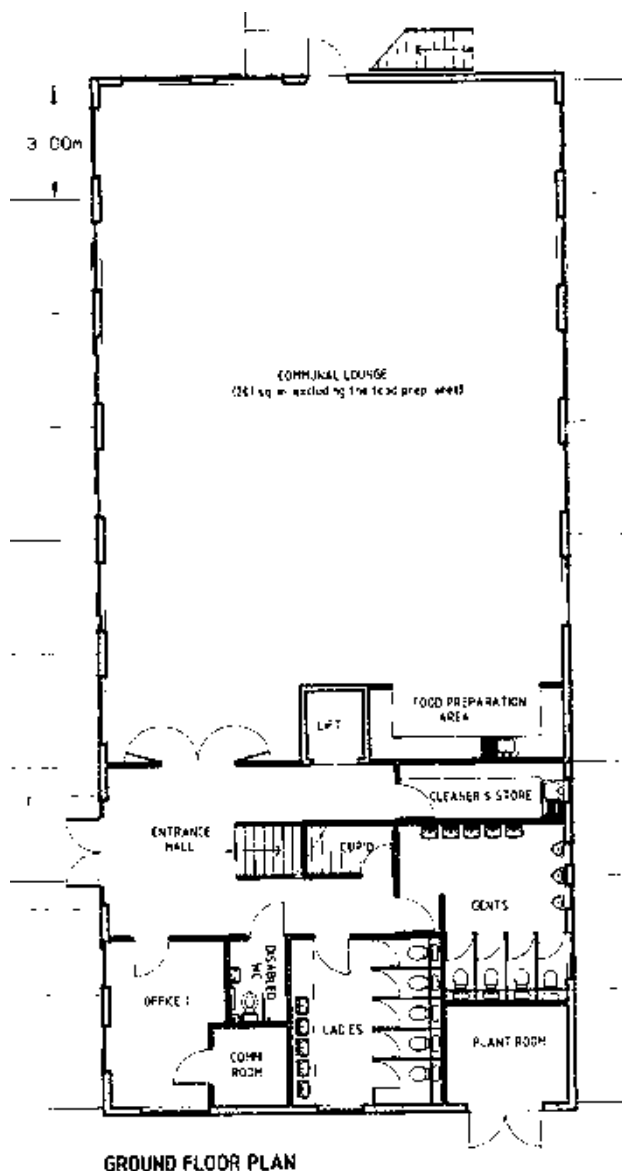
