



EXAMINATION RESULTS

Congratulations to all Penglais students who took examinations last year: their results were amongst the best of recent years. Sixth formers turned in a really impressive average grade score of AAC or 26 points. GCSE results in Year 11 were equally impressive with 69% achieving more than 5 grades at A*-C and 93% 5 grades at A*-G. The school was pleased to see the first results for the Welsh Baccalaureate which boosted overall performance in the sixth form. Also noteworthy were the results of the engineering group in Year 11 with 13 students gaining the full NVQ Level 2 qualification.

Well done to everyone: pupils, teachers and, of course, parents! As usual in the first newsletter of the year I append summary sheets for the various examinations. More detailed papers will be published in the annual governors' report which will be available in October.

THE NEW YEAR 7

Hopefully our new intake should be well settled in its new school. On Wednesday 24th October parents of the new Year 7 will be invited to a consultation evening with form tutors to review the first half term.

From time to time, photographs are taken of pupils for local and regional newspapers, brochures, competitions etc. We always ask parents for permission to do this and if any parents of new Year 7 pupils **do not wish their child to be photographed** they should notify the school office within a week of receiving this newsletter. We shall assume that permission has been granted unless we hear from you.

Please could parents of new pupils ensure that the school has an emergency contact number in case of illness or accident? Very rarely the school has to close in the winter due to inclement weather. In these circumstances it is vital that pupils know where they should go in case the school has to close early. It is important during bad weather conditions to listen to Radio Ceredigion for messages about school closures. We usually try to get a message on the radio by 8.00 a.m.

The school would like to remind new parents to ensure that Year 7 pupils put **name tags** on their clothing.

NEW ARRANGEMENTS FOR BUS PARKING

Over the summer holidays work was carried out to improve bus parking on site. We were not happy with all the changes and some modifications will be made in the next two weeks. We are supervising the arrival of buses in the morning and their departure in the afternoon – until the modifications are made please bear with us. I had hoped this could all have been sorted out before the start of the new term – I will be able to issue the new plans in the next newsletter.

As always, please take the greatest care in bringing your car onto this school site and follow the directions of school staff.

HOMEWORK

I would like to draw your attention to the school homework policy. Regular homework trains pupils in good working habits and helps them to organise their time. It also supports pupils' learning and informs parents about the type of work expected from their children. All pupils must complete homework: planners will have been given to all pupils in Years 7-13 to help them organise their time. Teachers will ensure that homework instructions are explained clearly and fully. Completion dates will be given and where homework is collected in for marking it should normally be returned within one week. Rooms are made available at lunchtime if pupils wish to use this facility. Teachers will adopt a common procedure if homework is not completed: obviously failure to complete homework is a serious matter and parents will be contacted.

The main features of our homework policy are as follows:

- There is a homework timetable for pupils in Key Stage 3 (Years 7, 8 and 9). This sets out the maximum amount of homework which may be set in each two-week cycle.
- It is not possible to devise a homework timetable for Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11) as the curriculum is flexible and the setting is complex. However, over a 10 day cycle, where appropriate, there will be three homework tasks in most subjects with more in Mathematics and Science.

- All pupils have been given planners in which to record the details of homework set.
- If homework is set pupils must complete it by the deadline given.
- Homework will not normally be required for the following day.
- Teachers may decide not to set homework if there is no appropriate task on a particular day.
- Some pupils in the lower sets and small classes may not be required to do homework in some subjects.
- Sixth Form students will act as Junior School Supporters who will help pupils, particularly in Year 7, to develop the skills necessary to plan and complete homework tasks.

Years 10 and 11

It is not possible to prepare a homework timetable for pupils in this age group because of the complexities of setting. However, over a 10-day cycle, there should be three homeworks in most subjects, with more in Mathematics and Science. There will normally be one homework task per cycle for RE. Each homework assignment should take about 30 minutes so that pupils have approximately 90 minutes homework each weekday. Teachers will encourage pupils to record coursework deadlines clearly in the planners. Where extended pieces of work or coursework assignments are set these may be carried out over a longer, specified period of time. Year Tutors have produced a coursework plan for the whole year so that, as far as possible, deadlines are evenly distributed.

Years 12 and 13

Here there will much emphasis on the students' own responsibility for organising their private study. All pupils will have received planners to help them do this. Guidelines have been given and experience has shown that a minimum of 20 hours of private study per ten-day cycle **over and above private study time in school** is required. Arrangements have been made for Subject Teachers and Form Tutors to monitor non-completion of assignments: where this becomes a serious problem the Head of Sixth Form will intervene and, if all else fails, the student will be asked to discontinue the course.

Generally parents can help by:

- ensuring that pupils have a place to do homework which is free from distractions.
- supporting pupils by giving encouragement.
- helping pupils to plan their time and organise themselves.
- checking pupils' planners from time to time and comparing the entries with the attached guidelines.
- contacting the school if their children are experiencing difficulties **or** if they are told that homework has not been set on a regular basis.

PUPIL SUPERVISION BEFORE SCHOOL

This is very important. The school opens later in the morning because of changes to the hours of the site team. The school is not open at all before 8.00am and no supervision is available until 8.40am. Most staff do not arrive until 8.30am.

FAIR TRADE

Undaunted by the torrential rain at the end of June the Penglais Fair Trade Group took part in Wales’ national Big Fair Trade Picnic event, cunningly holding the “picnic” inside in the dry. Forty pupils enjoyed healthy cereal bars, fruit juice, fruit and not so healthy (but very tasty) chocolate cake – there was also a chance to learn more about Fair Trade and a quiz. JAPANESE EXCHANGE

At the end of the summer term Penglais hosted eight students and two teachers from our exchange programme school in Osaka, Japan. Our Japanese guests gave the whole school an insight into Japanese culture through a series of excellent assembly performances featuring traditional dance, kendo, music and singing. During the week despite some great Welsh rain there were trips around Aberystwyth, Harlech castle, Devil's Bridge Railway and a boat trip from Newquay. There was also an action packed evening schedule of BBQs and beach parties. At the weekend the host families put on a range of activities including yachting, quad biking and trips to London. The Japanese students had a taste of various lessons, printing Welsh dragons in Art, learning modern dance steps in PE and making Welsh cakes in food tech. They also enjoyed a music performance by the lower school choir. This is always an interesting exchange as Osaka is the antithesis of Aberystwyth, being a large bustling city with a very fast pace of life – many of the students and teachers remarked on the peace and quiet and relaxed lifestyle that we have here. Some excellent friendships were forged and the host students will be visiting Japan next summer. SCIENCE

Biology – the Biology Department has a large cycad (*cycas revoluta*) which needs a new home. It measures 2m x 2m and is free to anyone prepared to look after it (and to transport it!) We also have a fish-tail palm (*caryota*) and one or two other assorted plants to give away. We have a limited number of pot grown locally sourced oaks for planting out. Biology A level students have had the opportunity to meet conservationists working in Cardigan Bay to learn more about the biology and ecology of the whales and dolphins found locally, threats to their survival and survey techniques used to monitor them. The group attended a talk by researchers from the Sea Watch Foundation's Newquay project before going out on one of their survey boats to see bottlenose dolphins in their natural habitat. Thanks to Sea Watch and the Millennium Stadium Charitable Trust for funding the trip.

Chemistry – During the summer holidays three Year 11 pupils Mathew Kelly, Sumuditha Ranawaka and Joe Warren attended Chemistry camps at different universities. The boys participated in a variety of activities, witnessed amazing demonstrations as well as experiencing a taste of university life staying in the university Halls of Residence. GEOGRAPHY

Iceland Expedition – There has been a fantastic response to the Iceland expedition that will be taking place in July 2008. 50 pupils and 6 staff will be taking part in what promises to be a once in a lifetime experience. Further details from Mrs. J. Elgood.

Year 7 Fieldwork – All Year 7 pupils will be taking part in one day of Geography fieldwork during October. MODERN LANGUAGES

The Modern Languages department is intending to take a 5 day trip to Northern France in May 2008. This will be offered to all pupils in Years 8 and 9 studying French and is an excellent opportunity for pupils to practise the French they already know and to pick up some more! There will be a full programme of excursions including visits to a French market, a V2 rocket museum, an opportunity for pupils to visit a traditional French bakery and a visit to Disneyland Paris! We will be staying at a small French chateau near St. Omer which caters specifically for school groups. In previous years this trip has proved to be highly popular with pupils. Some quotes from last year's trip include, "the French trip was sublime!", "Disneyland was fantastic!", the rocket museum was really good", "I liked seeing the chocolate factory" and last, but not least, "the food was really good". During the Summer holidays, we received the news that Freefall had been awarded the prize for New Compositions at the National Festival of Music for Youth. The adjudicators congratulated Tom Barry, Richard Davies, Sam Dunning, Russell Evans, Fred Harper and Hugh Parry on the excellence of their performance and on the quality of their composition work. The boys are now continuing their studies as Penglais sixth form Music students.

Music extra curricular activities

Rehearsals are already underway for the end of term concert at the Great Hall and for the Kronberg Christmas Market concert tour. Many extra curricular activities are on offer once again this year, both choral and instrumental. Everyone is invited to take part and will be made to feel welcome.
