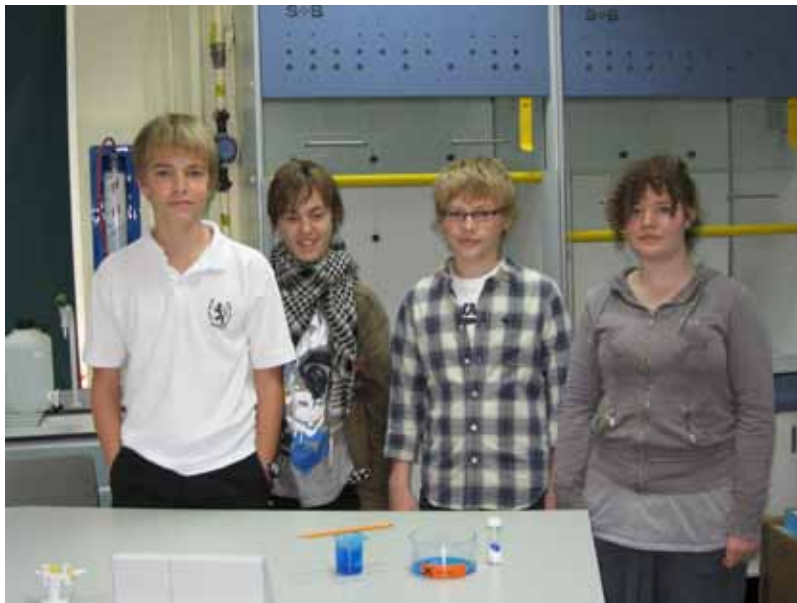

## OLYMPIC SUCCESS

Jackie Minchin was recently selected to swim for the Great Britain team at the Special Olympics. The European championships were held recently in Palmade, Mallorca. Thirty two European countries were there including Albania, Iceland, Sweden, Turkey and France. Jackie, who also works in the school office, has been swimming for over twenty years and travels to Cardiff every weekend to train. She has also previously swam for Wales in other tournaments. Jackie was most successful in the 50 metre backstroke in which she won Gold, she also competed in the 100 metre freestyle in which she won Silver and swam as anchor leg in the rely medley in which the team won Bronze. The GB team consisted of eight swimmers, four women and four men. They were chosen from Wales, England and Scotland but Jackie was very fortunate to be the only one chosen from Ceredigion.

## SEVERE WEATHER CLOSURES

With the onset of winter I should like to remind parents / guardians of our procedures for closing the school in the event of severe weather conditions.

The decision to close the school is based on several factors but in particular:

- the difficulty of transporting pupils, particularly to the rural areas
- the availability of key staff
- the expected disruption to the timetable
- liaison with Ysgol Penweddig.

If it is clear that poor weather makes opening difficult the school will **make a decision before 8.00am which will be broadcast on RADIO CEREDIGION**. When poor

weather is forecast or imminent, please check this radio station. A message will also be put onto the school website and on the school office answerphone.

If a severe weather event happens during the school day itself the situation is more complicated. The bus companies usually make the decision and arrive to transport pupils home during the day. Other pupils will be sent home once most of the buses have departed. Please ensure that we have a contact number for you: several pupils still do not have one. Again messages will be put on the website or sent by the text messaging service.

Although every effort is made to stay open the school's experience on the last two occasions with severe weather does make a decision to close more likely. It is difficult to sustain the daily routine once buses start arriving and staff who live in rural areas depart. Little useful work is, in fact, done on such days. To give you an idea of disruption it only needs 15 teachers (out of 90) to be away for a school of this size not to function. Cover cannot be arranged and supervision becomes difficult. A similar issue would arise if illness affected a significant number of staff.

## TRIPLE AWARD SCIENCE – YEAR 10 2010/11

Last year the school made a decision not to continue with Triple Award Science GCSE. The reasons for that decision may be summarised as:

- the difficulty of completing the syllabus in the Double Award time allocation
- the likelihood that pupils would achieve consistently higher grades with the Double Award course
- most medical schools do **NOT** require grades in Triple Awards Science
- the heavier content load in the new GCSE Triple Award Science syllabus.

At the recent meeting of parents with governors, several parents asked if the decision could be revisited for the current Year 9, starting GCSE courses in September 2010. The governors have decided that they would reconsider the issue if there was sufficient demand. The school would only offer the scheme:

- if in addition to Double Award time (10 periods) pupils took Triple Award as one of their options (an additional 4 or 5 periods)
- if a pupil took Triple Award Science he/she would only have 3 options left instead of the normal 4. This would inevitably restrict choices.

If you are a parent / guardian of a Year 9 pupil and would like the school to consider making Triple Award Science available in 2010-11 please write to Mr. Davey by **Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> December**. A decision would then be made in good time before the preparation of booklets for options.



## MESSAGES TO PUPILS

Could we please ask parents to make arrangements with their children before they leave for school in the mornings. The school receives many requests from parents during the day to pass on messages to their children. This is not always easy in a school of 1360 pupils with a large number of classrooms and no tannoy system! Could we request that parents only contact school to pass on messages in an emergency. ## Barcelona trip - October 2009

In early October, 18 pupils from years 10-13, flew out from Liverpool John Lennon Airport on a cold miserable morning to visit the area around Barcelona. We stayed in Calella, a small town on the outskirts of the city which had a lovely beach close to the hotel. The weather was really great – warm and sunny every day.

We spent all of Tuesday in Barcelona itself and managed to get a good feel for the city thanks to our helpful guide, Cristián, and our bus driver who navigated through Barcelona's

busy streets. We visited the Sagrada Familia Cathedral and learned that despite beginning work over a hundred years ago, it will not be complete until 2025! We saw a great deal of the architect Antoni Gaudí's work throughout the city and then had lunch in the Parc Guell, overlooking the city.
