SCHOOL CLOSURE

Once again the school had to be closed because of adverse weather conditions in December. In 2010 a total of six school days was lost due to poor weather and two other days significantly disrupted. This is highly unusual. In previous years

we have had closures but only occasionally and nothing like the scale of 2010.

One significant factor that made the situation worse was the very low temperatures that persisted after the snow had fallen. In previous years a thaw came fairly quickly but last year the low temperatures were exceptional and

persistent. The result was that impacted snow froze making the whole site hazardous for staff and pupils, let alone the difficulties encountered in having enough teachers to take classes. It took the site team days to make the whole site safe. We were only able to open on a limited basis for examination classes because a snow plough was made

available by the county council for a limited period.

The PTA has now decided to give the school more snow clearing equipment including gritters and a small snow plough attachment. This should help us to re-open more quickly should a similar situation arise in the future.

INSET DAYS AND CLOSURE DAYS

A reminder that the summer term now ends on Friday 15th July for pupils as the 18th and 19th have been designated as INSET days. This also means that Friday 18th March is no longer designated as an INSET day.

The spring term finishes on Friday 15th April and the summer term starts on Tuesday 3rd May. There had been a plan to designate these as INSET days as well but my understanding is that, due to the school closures because of bad weather, they are now designated as ordinary school days.

At the time of writing I was expecting information about whether there was to be a closure day for the royal wedding in the summer term as the event falls within the existing Easter holiday.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

Since 2001, 27th January every year has been set aside as Holocaust Memorial Day. This is the international day of remembrance for victims of the Holocaust and other genocides. On this day we honour the survivors of regimes of hatred and take the opportunity to reflect on the ways in which we live our lives today.

For 2011 the Holoaust Educational Trust has chosen 'Untold Stories' as the theme for the day. This year Cardiff is hosting the national event and two pupils from our sixth form have been invited to attend.

Mrs. Poyton from the History Department took advantage of the opportunity to take part in the Holocaust Educational Trust's Lessons from Auschwitz Project in June 2009. This involved hearing a testimony from a survivor of the Holocaust and a visit to the concentration and death camp at Auschwitz-Birkenau. Following on from this experience and the link made with the Holocaust Educational Trust, two sixth form students, Melissa Evans and Ellie Rowlands were able to participate in the LfA project in March 2010. Both girls valued the experience and were willing to share the lessons they had learned with our Year 9 pupils. We are privileged again this year, in that two students have again been invited to participate in the LfA project. On 9th February 2011 Isabella Hughes and Andrew Mackay will attend the first seminar session of the project before visiting Poland and Auschwitz-Birkenau on 15th February. We hope that they will also value this experience and that they will be prepared to share the lessons they learn within the school and the wider community.

On Monday 7th February Penglais will be visited by Mary Mihovilovic, an educator from the Holocaust Educational Trust. Mary will lead some introductory sessions for Year 9 pupils. The year group will then listen to the testimony of holocaust survivor Eva Clarke.

It is a privilege for us to welcome both Mary and Eva to our school. We are grateful to the Holocaust Educational Trust for co-ordinating the visit and we hope that by hearing Eva's testimony it will encourage our students to learn from the lessons of the Holocaust and make a positive difference in their own lives.

SUCCESS FOR MR ED


Penglais is very proud of Mr. Edwards, Head of Art, who has recently won a Welsh Icons Award in the category 'Children's Book of the Year'.

A group of sixty pupils from Years 7, 8 and 9 visited Theatr Hafren in Newtown just before Christmas to see Birmingham Stage Company's production of Horrible Science. This blend of Science and Drama was very different to our normal Science trip experience, involving as it did catchy cheesy songs, some great 3D effects and the chance to eat ice cream. We



learned many scientific facts such as "20% of bathroom door handles have traces of faeces on them" (the 3D flying faeces showing what happens when you flush a toilet were particularly effective at making the audience scream), "a single bacteria can multiply into 16 million bacteria in a mere 8 hours" and "the gas emitted when you break wind is methane and if harnessed could generate electricity in a power station". ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

Year 10 Controlled Assessment for English continued in week beginning 6th December 2010. These sessions assessed extended reading. The new controlled assessments which have been introduced in the current Year 10 for the first time replace both coursework and some elements previously assessed on the examination papers.


The idea behind this system is that students provide an original response without the drawbacks of 'over preparation' and will ensure that all students present 'authentic' work,

The stages of Controlled Assessment are as follows:-

- Introduction to task during this phase the teacher introduces students to the task to ensure they understand exactly what is required of them. Titles are provided by the WJEC.
- Research and planning during this part of the process students are able to work under limited supervision. Teachers are allowed to give general advice but are not allowed to write any comments on any preparatory work. If any support is given, for example, work sheets, these will have to be sent to the exam board for checking. Teachers are not allowed to instruct students to draft essays at home but the learning and teaching which will have taken place during this phase will mean that students should have thought how they approach the task and what important features they should consider. All students have been provided with resource booklets to support their learning for the tasks.
- The Controlled Task Students write their final piece of work or take part in a speaking and listening activity under controlled conditions and within a set time limit. Students are not allowed to draft their work or take notes into the task for Writing. They may take one A4 sheet of notes into the Reading task. This must not contain a plan or a draft essay.

Engineering Education Scheme of Wales

Six members of Year 12 who are studying Physics are taking part in the Engineering Education Scheme of Wales. This scheme allows students to solve real problems for a local company and gain experience in the area of engineering. This year's sponsors are Statkraft who own and operate the hydroelectric power station at Cwm Rheidol. Currently at the power station the Main Inlet Valve that feeds the water from the penstock or inlet tunnel and into the Main Generating Sets has a series of mechanical limit switches which require regular maintenance. The task for Penglais this year is to design a system which does not use these mechanical actuated switches currently employed and if possible upgrade the system to provide the position of the main inlet valve during operation. The new system must link into their current reporting and control system which includes an output to a pc display. Initially the students visited Cwm Rheidol to get a look at the problem. For the last three months they have spent their spare time researching and building a prototype of their solution. During this time they have attended a three day residential at Coleg Normal in Bangor were they built and tested their system. The students will present their solution to key members of Industry at Venue Cymru in Llandudno on the 4th April.

The Vocational Engineering class had the opportunity to get a glimpse into the world of motorsport thanks to the help of the drivers from local motor clubs. The group of 14 pupils from Year 11, who are currently taking NVQ Engineering, got to meet the drivers, look at their cars and also get hands on experience under the bonnet working with qualified mechanics. Both their teachers, Mr. Garwyn Davies and Mrs. Fiona Balchin, thought it would be very interesting for the pupils to see how the skills learnt in the workshop could be related to the real world and in particular to have some fun!

The Year 11 Engineering group got to experience what it was like to be a rally navigator for the day at Sweet Lamb Motorsport Complex in Llangurig. The pupils had the opportunity to navigate drivers from local motor clubs around the infamous 'bowl' where the World Rally Championships took place in November. Before they got to go out in the cars the pupils were shown how to prepare and check over a rally car by Chris Palmer. They changed wheels, checked oil and water and looked at the safety features that make a rally car different to a normal everyday road car. They were then taught how to plot a small course using maps and co-ordinates that would be used on a real road rally. The pupils then went in a car around the course getting code boards and marshals to sign their clip boards. They also had to negotiate obstacles such as Give Way signs and triangles. The pupils gained points throughout the day whilst Roamer Company, Magnet Trade and James Hatfield Motorsport Photography. The winning pupil was Nathan Edwards, closely followed in second place by Sam Morris with Geoff Macken taking third place.


