Homework Policy

Homework is work that is completed outside the timetabled curriculum (lessons) independent of the subject teacher. Homework plays an important role in developing students' study skills, enhancing learning and raising student achievement and as such is an integral part of the curriculum. We do not however, support homework being set for the sake of it. We trust in the professionalism of teachers to set well planned and purposeful homework that achieves specific outcomes and supports the learning of all students.

Homework supports students with:

- Taking ownership and responsibility for their learning
- Developing the skills of planning, time management and resilience
- Developing life –long independent learning skills
- Preparing themselves for assessments
- Engaging parents/ guardians in supporting their work

Homework can include:

- Learning aspects of the curriculum in preparation for assessments
- Reviewing or re-visiting previous learning
- Consolidating learning that has taken place in lessons
- Applying the learning that has taken place in lessons in a different context
- Extending knowledge or understanding of the work addressed in lessons
- Preparation for new learning activities prior to the lesson
- Research and information gathering

Quality Assurance

- Faculty and subject leaders will make sure that opportunities for meaningful and purposeful homework are planned into schemes of work, recorded and uploaded onto Class Charts
- Faculty and subject leaders will monitor the setting of homework through Class Charts and work scrutiny, as part of Faculty QA processes
- Faculty and subject leaders will monitor consistency regarding the amount, quality and assessment of homework across faculties and subjects
- Year Leaders will periodically check homework through learning walks, student voice and use of Class Chart data
- The senior leadership team will monitor the quality and consistency of homework across the school as part of whole school QA processes
