



Headteacher's Message

The newsletter is once again a reminder of the busyness of a school term and the delight we have had this term in re-engaging with activities after the Covid years. The sporting fixtures have started in earnest and the PE department should be very proud of their students' footballing abilities in particular, with three out of 5 of the age groups ending the term as Ceredigion Champions and another year group reaching the final. Clearly, there is young football talent coming through which will be much needed by Wales in future years!

We did celebrate Wales being in the World Cup for the first time in over 70 years and it was wonderful to see each year group together watching the game. These community events are important in bringing the school together and in celebrating the Welsh ethos within the school.

This term we have also launched Penglais as a Reading School. All Year 7 tutor groups have been reading Chinese Cinderella during their tutor time this term. I have had the privilege of visiting every tutor group as a guest reader at least once over the term and it has been lovely to hear from the students how much they have enjoyed reading the book together. They have worked with Mrs Davies, Head of English, to choose their next book and will read that next term. It greatly contributes to students' wellbeing as well as supporting them in improving their literacy.

One of the highlights for me this half term was the 'Jolabokafloed' during their wellbeing lessons. Mrs Liz Kennedy, using money from the Welsh Government and the Books Council of Wales, bought 890 books so that every student in Years 7 - 11 could choose a book to keep. Another highlight this term was the opening of the LSC building. Canolfan Ni, as it will now be called, will be opened officially in January, but it was a pleasure to be shown around the new building by one of the students. They are clearly very happy to be there and proud of the new space that they have.

Continuing UCAS successes for Year 13 students.

Year 13 students continue to be very successful with their UCAS applications. 38 students have submitted their applications so far, with another 20 or so to submit before Christmas. We have been absolutely delighted with the number and range of offers that students have already received, and we are very proud of all of them. 30 students have received a total of 81 offers from 40 excellent UK universities. 5 students have been called for interviews for Oxford and Cambridge, 2 for vocational programmes in midwifery, and radiography, and a further 3 students have received unconditional offers. One unconditional offer reads as follows: 'We are delighted to inform you that you have been selected for the University Guaranteed Places Programme based on the high quality of your application and the additional information you provided; particularly your excellent references and personal statement. Our programme seeks to identify applicants who we feel would excel and make a significant contribution to our academic community.' Students have had offers for a range of subjects including, Medicine, History, PPE, Physics, Aeronautical Engineering, Dentistry, Fashion Buying, Astrophysics, Geography, English Literature, Midwifery, Business and Entrepreneurship, Criminology, and Law. 4 students have already received offers from all their university choices, while others have had up to four out of five. Students have had offers from 14 different Russell Group Universities including 6 offers from Bristol and 6 from York. Our students continue to do very well, and, in order to build on this success, we are encouraging all the remaining year 13 students to get their applications under way as soon as possible.

Science News

Biology

The Biology department hosted two special guests in November – an armadillo and a tenrec. They were brought in by our Biology supply teacher, Mr. Farmer, who looks after unwanted zoo animals and exotic pets.

Mr. Farmer's students were very excited to see the animals up close, and word soon spread with other students and teachers rushing to see them at break and lunch. Some students were able to watch the armadillo having her lunch and walking around the classroom. Armadillos are nocturnal so she went back to sleep soon after her meal, enabling us to admire the amazingly snug way she could roll up into a ball, totally encased in her armour of bony plates. The tenrec was much more active, sniffing out the new smells in the classroom.

Students asked lots of questions and then did some further internet research about the animals, their adaptations and their habitats. They found out that the species are insectivorous and the armadillo's armour and the tenrec's spines are protection from predators. Wild tenrecs live in a habitat called spiny forest in Madagascar, a lot of which is sadly being destroyed for agriculture, while wild armadillos live in south America and are under threat from habitat loss and hunting by humans.

We are very grateful to Mr. Farmer for giving us the opportunity to see these amazing animals and learn more about them.

Mathematical Olympiad for Girls

Mathematical Olympiad for girls is run by UKMT trust to encourage girls to tackle advanced mathematical problems. It is aimed at girls in Years 12 and 13 across the UK and consists of five challenging problems. It is a 2.5 hours competition consists of five interesting and challenging Maths problems.

This year Kemi, Lexie, Somachi and Anna from the Further Maths classes took part in the challenge. Everyone has performed very well and Kemi has secured herself a Merit certificate.

Senior Maths Challenge 2022 Result

This year Senior Maths Challenge was held on 4th October in UK. 48 students from year 12 and year 13 took part in the challenge and 26 have been awarded a gold, silver or bronze certificate.

UKMT Maths challenges are run by university of Leeds to encourage mathematical reasoning, precision of thoughts and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. Certificates are awarded to the highest scoring 40% of the candidates (Gold : Silver : Bronze = 1:2:3)

Parent Information

We ask that parents that receive a message from their child to contact the school attendance to ask if the child has been to report being unwell as any non-attendance must be recorded correctly.
